#### CIC

- A growing number of employers expect employees to have or be working toward certification in Infection Control
- CIC credential identifies healthcare professionals who have shown mastery in knowledge in infection control by passing the certification exam

#### CIC

- APIC Strategic Plan 2020 set a goal for IPs
  - The majority of IPs will demonstrate core competency in infection prevention and control through board certification
  - The role and value of IPs will be strengthened through greater adoption of a standardized credential
  - According to CBIC, there are 7,703 CIC (April 17, 2020)
    - Pass rate initial exam 69.4%
    - Pass rate for recert 87.6%

# Why CIC?

- Studies show that hospitals with CIC IPs have lower rates of MRSA BSI, CLABSI (apic.org)
- ▶ 30% of employers required CIC to apply or maintain employment (AJIC, 2019)
- CIC professionals earn 25% higher salary (AJIC, 2019)

## CIC eligibility

- Proof of post-secondary degree from an accredited academic institution (an Associate's degree or higher)
  - Or three-year diploma RN degree (accepted through December 31, 2020 only)
- Currently accountable for infection prevention activities/program reflected in job description
  - Provide official job description on employer letterhead
- Currently responsible for the following:
  - ID of infectious disease processes
  - Surveillance and epidemiologic investigation
  - Prevention and controlling the transmission of infectious agents

## CIC eligibility

- Actively preform at least two of the following:
  - Employee/occupational health
  - Management and communication
  - Education and research
  - Environment of Care
  - · Cleaning, sterilization, disinfection and asepsis

## Steps for Certification

- Review CIC eligibility requirements
- STUDY!
- Submit application with supporting documents and application fee
- Schedule and take exam in 90 days
  - Nearby testing centers in Concord, Portsmouth, Portland ME, Lowell MA
- When successful, valid for 5 years
  - Ex. If obtain 07/6/2020-valid until 12/31/2025

### a-IPC

- The Associate Infection Prevention and Control: Entry-level certification examination is a measure of basic infection prevention competency.
- It is intended for the novice IP and for those interested in pursuing careers in infection prevention and control.
- It is also intended for those who do not yet meet the eligibility requirements for the CIC<sup>®</sup>.
- The a-IPC is an objective, multiple-choice examination consisting of 100 questions.
  - 85 of these questions are used in computing the score.

#### a-IPC continued

- There are no eligibility requirements necessary to apply for the a-IPC
- Offered at testing centers
- Valid for three years
- Is not renewable
  - Once the three-year period is up, it is expected that candidates will become CIC.

## Legislation

- CMS 482.42(a):
  - The hospital must demonstrate that an individual who is qualified through education, training, experience, or certification in infection prevention and control is appointed to oversee the program
- Colorado: take certification exam within 6 months after becoming eligible
- Nevada: medical facility with > 175 beds must have CIC IP Officer
- New Jersey: IP professionals shall have education and training and shall be certified within 5 years of beginning practice (and maintain CIC)

#### Recertification

Recert is required every 5 years in order to maintain CIC

### Recert by Examination

- Internet based examination must be purchased by November 30 and completed by December 31
  - COVID extension—must be completed by March 31st
- Recert candidates who do not pass the exam cannot retake the recert exam, but can apply to recert by initial certification exam (at a testing site)

#### Recertification by Continuing Education

#### 40 IPUS needed

Domains refer to 8 categories of the examination

- 1. Investigation of infectious disease process
- 2. Surveillance and epidemiologic investigation
- 3. Prevention and control of the transmission of infectious agents
- 4. Employee or occupational health
- 5. Management and communication
- ▶ 6. Education and research
- 7. Environment of care
- 8. Cleaning, sterilization, disinfection, and asepsis

Continuing ed. must include 6 of the 8 domains Hint: National conference covers all 8 domains!

#### Recertification by Continuing Education

On-line, paper or live format from approved or accredited source that provides continuing ed. credits	1 hour=1 IPU per activity hr. Ex. APIC, CDC, SHEA, 3M	
Attendance at approved/accredited organizational offering (multi day or single day) *Must be >5.5 contact hours or use live format from above	10 IPUs Ex. APIC/APIC NE	
National (or international) Conferences	10 IPUs Ex. (APIC, SHEA, IDSA)	
Academic education: enrolled in accredited program that offer specific education that would advance profession	10 IPU (max)	
Publications: Published in peer reviewed journal	5 IPU per publication	

## Recertification by Continuing Education

Presentation: Chapter, state or national conference. Deliver webinar or present poster	2 IPU per 1 hour presentation/poster
Participation on local/state/national local IP organization as committee member/voluntary leadership	5 IPU per term per role
Teaching	1 IPU per hour of instruction (max 5 IPU)
Research	5 IPU per research activity

## Keeping track of IPUs

- Begin accumulating IPUs as soon as you certify/recertify
- Be sure on-line courses are accredited or approved
  - NH BON requires contact hours rather than CEU, include documentation of contact hour requirements in supporting documentation

## Keeping track of IPUs

- Keep certificates of attendance/completion
- Obtain copies of brochures/flyer/syllabus and obtain letter (on letterhead) with your name, the name of the webinar or presentation, the date and length of the webinar or presentation, and a synopsis of webinar or presentation focus

## Keeping track of IPUs

- Obtain appointment letter on organization letterhead (separate for each role held) including name, role, dates of term and a signature from committee chair
  - Term must be completed within recert period
  - Example: if recertifying in 2021, term on NHICEP as Board member 2021-2022 would not qualify

#### Recertification Portfolio

- Access professional portfolio on CBIC website on or after January 1<sup>st</sup> of recertifying year
- Begin recording activities in professional portfolio
- Upload verification documents
  - Letters, bylaws, certificate of attendance, brochures
- Submit portfolio by October 31st
  - Extended to Jan 31, 2021
  - Allow 30 business days for review of portfolio

### Celebrate

- Share certification with manager/leader
  - Demonstrates commitment
  - Potential reimbursement
- Share with marketing
- Post certification in your office!
